A significant milestone in the history of tourist guiding in Saudi Arabia was the UNESCO recognition of several sites as World Heritage Sites. Starting with the Al-Hijr Archaeological Site (Madâin

Sâlih)¹ in 2008, followed by the inclusion of the At-Turaif District in Diriyah ²in 2010, the Historic Jeddah, the Gate to Makkah in 2014, the Rock Art in the Hail Region in 2015, and the Al-Ahsa Oasis in 2018, these recognitions underscored the global significance of Saudi heritage. Each acknowledgment by UNESCO not only highlighted the rich historical narratives and cultural significance of these sites but also underscored the need for skilled tourist guides who could convey these stories to the world (UNESCO World Heritage Centre, 2024).

The launch of Vision 2030 marked a pivotal turn in the evolution of tourist guiding in Saudi Arabia. Under this ambitious plan, the Kingdom aims to diversify its economy away from oil dependency, with tourism identified as a key sector for development. Vision 2030's goals include increasing the number of visitors to Saudi Arabia by developing its tourism infrastructure, promoting its cultural and heritage sites, and enhancing the overall visitor experience. As part of these efforts, the Saudi government has taken significant steps to professionalize tourist guiding, recognizing it as a crucial element in achieving these objectives³.

The Saudi Association for Tourist Guides, which was licensed about three years ago, aims to improve the working environment for tour guides, contribute to conducting studies, and encourage Saudi youth to join this profession (Saudi Arabia's Official Gazette, 2024). This period has seen the establishment of training programs and licensing requirements for tourist guides to ensure they are well-equipped to represent Saudi Arabia's cultural heritage accurately and engagingly (Saudi

Arabia's e-Government Portal, 2024). The Saudi Commission for Tourism and National Heritage (SCTNH), now part of the Ministry of Tourism, has been instrumental in setting standards and offering training courses for guides. The introduction of evisas and the relaxation of entry requirements for tourists under Vision 2030 have further underscored the need for a professional cadre of tourist guides, capable of catering to an international audience with diverse interests and expectations.

Moreover, initiatives like the development of the Red Sea Project and the Qiddiya entertainment megaproject, among others, signify the Kingdom's commitment to expanding its tourism offerings beyond cultural heritage to include eco-tourism, adventure tourism, and entertainment (Vision 2030. "Projects.", 2024). These developments not only broaden the scope of tourist guiding but also highlight the evolving role of guides as ambassadors of a new, diverse Saudi tourism experience.

The number of tourist guides of both genders recently jumped from 300 to 600 guides, indicating that the plan for next year includes doubling this number to 1200 tourist guides, and reaching 4500 tourist guides by the year 2030 (Vision 2030. "Projects.", 2024)."

It also enhances the tourism experience for visitors by offering a The government and various organizations have supported initiatives to train and license female tourist guides, recognizing their potential to contribute uniquely to the tourism experience. Women guides bring diverse perspectives, deep cultural insights, and a nuanced understanding of Saudi heritage, enriching the narrative and making tours more relatable to a wider audience, including families and female travelers.

Saudi Females Pioneers in Tour Guiding

Saudi Arabia has consistently demonstrated its need for female tour guides, and through various situations and jobs, society has recognized women's ability to compete, excel, and succeed.

There are unique stories in this field, but they were the first light on the long road to empowering women in it. Abeir Abusuliman holds the title of the first Saudi female tour guide, her passion led her to work as a guide and introducer to the secrets of old Jeddah. Her linguistic skills, holding a degree in English Literature, aided her in this endeavor, and she was among the first to obtain a license to work as a guide later (E3rafaktar, 2023).

She also contributed to opening the training field in front of female students at the College of Tourism Guidance in the Kingdom, to train them on how to conduct these tours. Saudi tour guide Mariam Al-Harbi was able to steal the spotlight in the tourism field, which was exclusively for men, by winning the "Best Tour Guide in the Kingdom" award for 2017, making her the first Saudi woman to receive this title.

Several female guides have become pioneers in the field, breaking stereotypes, and inspiring others to follow in their footsteps. These women have successfully navigated challenges, combining their passion

more comprehensive understanding of Saudi culture from diverse perspectives⁵.

for Saudi heritage with professional skills to deliver compelling and engaging tours. Their stories of perseverance and achievement have been instrumental in encouraging more women to consider careers in tourist guiding. One notable example is Rasha Al Agha, who became one of the first licensed female tourist guides in Saudi Arabia. Her journey into the profession was driven by a deep-seated love for her country's history and a desire to share its rich cultural narratives with the world. Rasha's success has paved the way for other women, demonstrating that tourist guiding is a viable and rewarding career path for women in Saudi Arabia (Radio Sawa, 2024).

Salma Al-Qahtani, a tourist guide in Asir, that ancient artifacts have occupied her thoughts since childhood, which motivated her to realize her dream of becoming a tourist guide for these eternal archaeological landmarks. She says, "Among these artifacts, I find myself a peace ambassador reaching towards the horizon, concerned with the culture, history, and authenticity of the Asir region's environment." Regarding her beginnings, she says, "When the acceptance door for Saudi female guides opened, I submitted my file to the National Tourism and Heritage Authority in Asir and joined a training course that included 26 trainees." About the future, Al-Qahtani says: 'My goal is to establish a tourism company to organize tourist trips from inside and outside the Kingdom to introduce the Arab and foreign visitor to my country's heritage ". Al-Qahtani invited young women who have a passion and love for heritage to pursue a tourist guide license, to work in this distinguished field (Okaz Newspaper, 2023).

Tourist guide Sarah Issa expressed her passion for tourism and exploring archaeological sites, which led her to join tourist guiding. Issa finds no difference between the work of men and women as tourist guides, indicating that she feels no embarrassment in working in this field. She confirmed that her family encourages her to join this rich field. Issa added, "I fear the lack of attention from specialists in the tourist guide, who bears the responsibility for the success of the tourist trip and presenting a positive image of his country to the tourist, as the guide is the main source of information that tourists obtain about the civilizational, historical, cultural heritage, and the customs, traditions, and social life experienced by the inhabitants of these tourist areas (Okaz Newspaper, 2023).

Mahbouba Al-Juhani, the first tour guide in Yanbu, western Saudi Arabia, works as a director for the women's branch of a national travel and tourism institution, offering a unique experience that broke many taboos. She started designing tourism programs in the field of diving, which Yanbu is famous for, Yanbu safari program, mountain climbing programs, and special programs for rural tourism there. Manal Al-Surur is the first tour guide fluent in sign language in the southern region. The Saudi Commission for Tourism and National Heritage in the Asir region granted her a license along with a group of guides after completing a 5-day training and qualification program for tour guides organized by the National Center for Human Resources Development "Takamul" at the Commission (Sapq News, 2023).

As for the guide Maha AlHussein, she hosted more than 16 tourists in her home in Riyadh, where she began the idea while experimenting with one of the applications serving travelers in 2019. She tells "Independent Arabia" that she hosted a Japanese tourist in her home after seeing the tourist's desire to come to Riyadh and look for accommodation for three days. Her family welcomed the idea and agreed to host the tourist, who experienced staying with a Saudi family, tasting Najdi food, and learning about the customs and traditions of the region. After that, she hosted tourists from China, New Zealand, Australia, America, Spain, and Japan (Okaz Newspaper, 2023).

The inclusion and empowerment of women in the tourist guiding profession in Saudi Arabia represent a significant step forward in achieving gender equality and diversifying the workforce. By breaking down barriers and challenging stereotypes, female tourist guides are reshaping societal perceptions and contributing to the dynamic growth of the tourism sector. Their stories of success and leadership not only enrich the cultural tourism experience but also inspire future generations of women to pursue their passions and ambitions in the tourism industry and beyond.

The profession of tourist guiding in Saudi Arabia, amidst its rapid growth and significant contributions to the tourism sector, encounters several challenges that test the adaptability and expertise of guides. These challenges, ranging from cultural sensitivities and language barriers to the evolving expectations of modern travelers, necessitate a strategic approach to ensure the profession not only thrives but also enhances the overall tourism experience in the kingdom. At the same time, these challenges present unique opportunities for growth, innovation, and the elevation of the tourist guiding profession within the context of Saudi Arabia's tourism boom under Vision 2030.

Challenges Faced by Tourist Guides in Saudi Arabia

Tourist guides must handle cultural sensitivities to respect local norms while providing an enriching experience for guests. This entails knowing and explaining the importance of religious places, cultural standards, and social etiquette to visivarious backgrounds. tors from linguistic hurdles: Because Saudi Arabia has a global audience, linguistic hurdles can be a big obstacle. Tourist guides must often be multilingual or have excellent communication mechanisms in place to cater to tourists from all over the world, ensuring that language difficulties do not detract from the tour's quality (Velasquez, 2005).

To address cultural sensitivities, ongoing training programs for tour guides emphasize the value of cultural knowledge and courteous communication. These programs provide guides with the information and skills needed to bridge cultural gaps, ensuring that tours are conducted in a way that honors Saudi Arabia's legacy while being accessible to a worldwide audience. To suit modern tourists' growing expectations, tourist guides and tour operators are encouraged to create novel and individualized tour experiences. This entails incorporating technology, such as virtual reality or mobile apps, and emphasizing storytelling that highlights the distinctive qualities of Saudi culture, history, and natural beauty.

Tourist guides significantly contribute to sustainable tourism efforts in Saudi Arabia. They advocate for practices that respect both the environment and local traditions, guiding tourists towards supporting sustainable activities and local enterprises. This focus on sustainability helps direct tourism benefits to local communities and conservation projects, ensuring tourism development is both environmentally and culturally beneficial. Guides' deep local knowledge enables them to spotlight initiatives that tourists can support, thus ensuring tourism serves as a force for positive cultural and natural heritage preservation.

Tourist guides play a pivotal role in amplifying the economic benefits of tourism, extending their influence far beyond the immediate tourism industry. They serve as conduits to local businesses, advocating for traditional markets, artisan workshops, and authentic local dining experiences. This not only enriches the tourists' experience but also funnels financial advantages towards smaller, communitycentric enterprises (Weiler & Black, 2015). By guiding tourists towards less explored attractions and immersing them in the local culture and crafts, guides contribute to a more balanced distribution of tourism revenue, bolstering the sustenance of local artisans, vendors, and small business owners. Moreover, the growing demand for knowledgeable tourist guides fosters job creation and opens avenues for professional enhancement within the tourism sector, fueling economic progress and expansion. The drive towards professionalizing tourist guiding, emphasizing quality and sustainable practices, positions Saudi Arabia more competitively on the global tourism stage, drawing in visitors with a keen interest in immersive cultural and educational travel experiences.

Looking ahead, the tourist guiding profession in Saudi Arabia finds itself at a crossroads of tradition and progress, steered by technological advancements, the swift growth of the tourism industry, and a steadfast dedication to presenting the kingdom's extensive cultural heritage to an international audience.
